ST JOSEPH'S ELECTION: 12th Dec 2019

As members of the British public gave their vote in the general election this year, students at St Joseph's were given the opportunity to voice their opinions on the politics of the country. Representatives from year 12 and year 13 politics students chose a party and campaigned on behalf of that party around the school. The Labour party was represented by Alex Craig and Molly McIvor, the Conservative party by James Athley and Cade Kirtley, Brexit Party was represented by Oran McGinness and Connor Sinclair and lastly the Liberal Democrats by Niamh Ennis and Reece Balai. For the election campaigns, the students were required to make a 2 minute video in which they explain the policies of their chosen party and aimed to convince the rest of the school to give them their vote. These videos were shown to all pupils in a tutor session.

On Thursday 12th December, a polling station was set up opposite the juice bar with the help of many sixth form students and classes were brought down to hand in their votes. As the pupils queued up to vote, the candidates took this as a last chance to talk to some classes about politics and to convince them to vote for their party.

The results of the election showed that the overall turnout of the election was 93%. Easily in the lead was the Labour party with a massive 59% of votes, followed by the Liberal Democrats with 19% of votes, Brexit Party with 12% and finally the Conservatives with 10% of votes.


SOCIAL ACTION: Christmas 2019
