Plastic is composed of major toxic pollutants. Plastic pollution is when plastic has gathered in an area and began to negatively impact the natural environment and create problems for plants, wildlife, and even the human population. Plastic is an incredibly useful material, but because it is meant for durability, it is not biodegradable.

Some of the changes which have already occurred are:

- Cookies are no longer served in a plastic wrapping.
- Plastic straws are to be replaced by paper straws
- Plastic cups in the refectory for slushes and milkshakes are to be replaced by a recyclable 'take-away coffee- cup' style
- Plastic cups in first aid are to be replaced by a paper cone style cup
- 'Switch off the light switch' signs have been placed beside light switches in school. Thank you to Laura Innes and Nicholas Balls for your winning entries.
- ♦ Members of the school council and 9D2 have volunteered for weekly litter picks.
- The heating temperature has also been lowered and teachers have been asked to keep windows closed as much as possible to retain the heat in the building

Further to this, we encourage students to bring refillable water bottles to school rather than single use bottles, as well as avoiding using plastic carrier bags to continue to support our Environment.

But it doesn't stop there...

Miss Oliver is taking four year 9 students, Olivia Hall, Grace Ford, Connor Bray and Aaron Whyte, to South Shields Town Hall to be part of South Tyneside's Youth Parliament events which are focusing on Climate Change 2020. We cannot wait to see what further ideas our representatives wish to bring into our school.



Miss Bradbury has established an eco-council who are working towards achieving Eco-Schools Status for St. Joseph's. They are currently working towards the bronze award and have decided to focus on **litter, waste and school grounds.** Watch this space for further updates on their progress!
