

18/03/1940 - One of the most important days in World War Two, Alan Turing watched as his code breaking machine, the 'Bombe' was installed at the topsecret Bletchley Park. A vital part in the breaking of the German Enigma codes, each machine contained 12 miles of wiring and nearly 100,000 parts!

23/03/1933 – Following an attack on the Reichstag, Adolf Hitler passed a law turning Germany into a dictatorship. 'The Enabling Act', asked Parliament to vote itself into irrelevance and with hindsight, was a deeply significant moment. One of the main events in Hitler's surge to power, this event has recently been studied as part of the year 9 course.

25/03/1944 – The Great Escape. A massive breakout of Allied prisoners of war, months in the planning, took place and seventy-seven men managed to escape through 102-metre-long tunnel. Sadly, one escapee was spotted and the tunnel was filled with sewage and debris. Only three men made it out of Nazi Germany.

Friday 19th March marks the feast day of our school's patron saint, St. Joseph. Today, we remember a remarkable man called by God to a unique vocation, namely raising the Son of God.

Happy St. Joseph's Day everyone!

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At that time, raising someone else's child was a dangerous thing to do and could have led to the death penalty for himself and the Virgin Mary but Joseph said 'yes' to God's call, showed immense faith and courage and gave Jesus the best earthly upbringing that he could.

Just after Jesus' birth, Joseph saved his life by listening to God's Angel's message and fleeing to Egypt as refugees to save him from King Herod's genocide of all baby boys born at that time.

St. Joseph also worked tirelessly hard as a humble carpenter, a trade that he also taught to his son Jesus. Joseph gave what little money he had to spare to ensure Jesus was taught the scriptures of the Torah, something which cost a lot and was reserved for the sons of the Jewish leaders. Joseph was willing to sacrifice whatever he could to give his son the best upbringing that he could. Joseph enveloped Jesus in love, kindness, care and protection. He was a devoted father and steadfast in his commitment to fulfilling God's call. Joseph is the patron Saint of Fathers, workers, carpenters and unborn babies. This week, we ask St. Joseph to pray for each and everyone of you! God bless you all.

This week we have 'Saint Mania' as we also have the privilege of celebrating the patron Saint of Ireland's day, St. Patrick on Wednesday 17th March. St. Patrick was kidnapped as a child by pirates and forced to work as a slave for 6 years doing back breaking work in Ireland. After 6 years he managed to escape and sail home to Britain.



Whilst in Britain, Patrick had a vision from Jesus telling him to go and make 'disciples of all nations' in Ireland. He did just that, deciding to become a priest, sail back to the land where he had once been held a slave and convert pagans. He built churches, set up monasteries and faith schools and brought Jesus' love and teachings to the hearts of the Irish people. 


