Pentecost happened 50 days after the resurrection of Jesus. The disciples received the Holy Spirit and were able to speak in tongues. Christians believe that they can also receive spiritual gifts from the Holy Spirit after confirmation.

Confirmation completes the process of initiation (Baptism and Holy Communion) and is one of the seven sacraments of the Catholic Church. It is the start of an active religious life involving service to others.



Roman Catholics believe in the Trinity. This is a mystery which can never be understood. There is one God but three persons of the Godhead. They are all God.




What happens at sacrament of confirmation?

4. The Bishop will lav his hands on the candidate to invite the gift of the Holy spirit to be passed down on the candidate.

5. The Bishop anoints the candidate with Oil of Chrism, making the sign of the cross on their forehead and speaks their confirmation name. The oil symbolises the sealing of the Holy spirit.



Holocaust Theology

- Prejudice means to pre-judge someone before you know them.
- It usually involves stereotypes.
- <u>Discrimination</u> is when you act on prejudice.
- ♦ Discrimination means to treat someone differently because of race, religion, gender, age or disability.
- Racism is treating someone differently/with hostility because of race

The Holocaust has had a <u>huge impact on Judaism</u>. It resulted in the loss of two thirds of European Jews. It also resulted in many discussions about God and why he could allow such terrible events to happen.

The Holocaust has caused many Jews to...

- Question their faith and the special relationship Jews are meant to have with God.
- Stop believing in God after their experiences.
- Strengthen faith because they believe God helped end the Holocaust
- Argue why God is still good in spite of evil in the world eg. free
 will






Rescuers like Corrie Ten Boom were motivated by their religious faith to help those suffering during the Holocaust. Corrie argued that we are all equal before God and that we should always follow God's law of treating each other with love, compassion and respect for life.







<u>The Holocaust</u> refers to the mass murder of 6,000,000 Jews by the Nazis between 1942-45.

The Nazis, led by Adolf Hitler, felt that Jewish blood had polluted the Ayran race and felt that were inferior and should be banished from Germany. It was a racial issue.

- They imposed a series of restrictions on the Jews throughout the 1930s which slowly stripped them of their rights, freedoms and dignity.
- Jews were forced to <u>register</u> and wear a <u>yellow star</u> on their clothes. They were prevented from attending mainstream school, universities, from attending parks, theatres, swimming pools and restaurants. Jews were prevented from owing businesses and were not allowed to call themselves German. They were eventually rounded up and transported to concentration/extermination camps.
- As the 1930s and 40s progressed, the Nazis decided on mass murder rather than banishment.
