










Why Should I Study GCSE Art?

Why Study Art As One Of Your GCSE Options?

- As an Art student, you need to strike a good balance between doing the things you love and backing them up with hard evidence and research if you are to succeed on the course with an excellent grade. You can't just study visual arts at GCSE because you like drawing or painting.

Art, craft, and design

Graphic communication

Fine art

Textile design

What qualities does an Art & Design allow you to develop?

Here are a number of transferable skills that you can learn through an arts education?

- Creativity: In a word full of trained professionals and highly educated workers, creativity is one of the top skills that set someone apart from the pack. Art education allows students to express themselves and think outside of the box.
- Collaboration: Working together for a common purpose teaches children that their contribution is important, which is perfect for the collaborative nature of the arts.
- Confidence: The arts create a safe space for students to explore their talents and build their confidence. Students who are shy in a normal classroom setting may gain the assurance to stand up and talk about their artwork. The sense of pride gained through a finished product encourages the students to keep trying and striving to accomplish more.
- Cultural Awareness & Empathy: The arts provide a unique platform to discuss many different cultures, socioeconomic levels, and current events. Through the arts, students have a place not only to learn about different cultures than their own, but also to ask questions and be more informed about the daily struggles and realities of people who may seem different.
- Critical Thinking: When students are making a work of art, the
 process includes conceptual and interpretational thinking that helps
 build their critical thinking skills including observation, reasoning,
 and problem-solving.







What qualities does GCSE Art allow you to develop?

When it comes to careers, an Art & Design course can be beneficial to routes such as fine art, illustration, teaching of humanities, fashion design, architecture, astronomy, politics, new media, photography, art history, expert in cultural studies, animation, body art and web design.
